



Western Regional Information Services Center (WRISC)

4,299 Support Requests resolved (Sept.-May)

WRISC is one of seven regional ISCs in the State of Washington and currently serves 20 school districts with a combined student population of more than 50,000. WRISC software support analysts provide training and guidance to member school district personnel in the use of Skyward's Student and Business (Fiscal/Human Resources/Payroll) Information Systems to ensure accurate collection and statewide reporting of student and financial information. In addition, WRISC operates a fee-for-service for Business Services to districts which includes payroll, personnel and fiscal management.

Workers' Compensation

15 Districts Served by Self-Insurance Services for on-the-job injuries

Programs to reduce claims including return-to-work, accident investigations, safety assessments and pre-employment physical capacity exams designed to minimize claim costs, reduce exposures, and have successful return to work outcomes for injured workers. Workers' Compensation claims are handled in-house to provide localized service.

Network Services Network Services is the first level data and video liaison for maintenance and service upgrades between districts and the state K-20 network. Forums and training sessions featuring new technologies for district/department technology support professionals. Comprehensive network, desktop, and mobile infrastructure support services offered on contract and hourly rate basis.

The School Safety & Security Cooperative,

in its fifth year of operation, strives to provide a consistent level of comprehensive safety and security services for students, staff, parents and community members.

- 12 school districts represent the cooperative
- 10 region-wide professional development events were offered



Events included: Incident Command System, Student Threat Assessment Teams Level 1, Student Threat Assessment Teams Level 2, A Counselor's Role in Responding to a Crisis, Signs of Suicide, Digital Threat Assessment (Basic) Emerging Issues in School Safety, a Comprehensive School Safety Planning Webinar, and lessons learned from Sandy Hook Elementary school shooting.

School Safety & Security Resolution: In 2017-2018, special emphasis was placed on providing School District Superintendents, Law Enforcement, Fire Services, Emergency Management, and Mental Health senior leaders to discuss school safety and security. Several elected boards and other government officials adopted a resolution to promote support between all school safety stakeholders.
