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#### **ABOUT STUDENT SERVICES**

The Student Services Center provides student reengagement services, student dropout intervention services, and facilitates other student support programs such as the Student Counseling Enhancement Project, Pathways to Success, and 21<sup>st</sup> Century SUCCESS.

#### 2014-2015 Program Outcomes

#### **Addressing Barriers**

These programs address non-academic barriers, social, emotional and behavioral supports and support districts in variety of ways. Examples include:

- Over **879** students have been served during 2014-15 in multiple programs, including Afterschool **SUCCESS**, which saw **125** students participate in three elementary schools.
- **91** school professionals were trained in the Networks for Life Suicide Prevention, Intervention and PostVention. **82%** reported they agreed or strongly agreed this class enabled them to improve student learning and **83%** said the course increased their skills in instruction.
- The Student Services staff assisted and responded to **10** school crisis experiences.

# METHODS

#### Project evaluation data are collected in the following tools:


- Student services tracking by BHCEP staff in Excel logs submitted monthly
  - Elementary school logs include: demographics, participation status, external referrals, staff contacts, parent contacts, Daily Living Assessment (DLA) score, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and contacted staff names
  - High school logs include: participation status, staff contacts, parent contacts, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and contacted staff names
- Staff survey on paper with self-addressed, stamped envelope; distributed in May 2015
- Parent survey on self-addressed, stamped post card; mailed to parents in May 2015.
- Pre and post testing on half-sheet paper surveys at school, parent and community trainings on suicide, substance abuse and mental health topics


#### **RESULTS**


Table 1 (page 3) includes the annual results for BHCEP outcome and project reach measures. The project exceeded every target! Key results are described as follows:

Student Participation

- 589 high school and 267 elementary school students were referred to BHCEP. Referrals were highest at the beginning of the school year; high school referrals were likely higher than elementary due to the option for self-referral following classroom presentations by BHCEP staff
- 226 high and 185 elementary school students completed an intake assessment with BHCEP staff
- The number of students in services was highest in the month of March for both high school (n=169) and elementary school (n=162) students









# **Adverse Childhood Experiences**

- 77% of high school and 82% of elementary school students have at least one ACE (excluding ever in foster care or ever involved in CPS)
- Nearly half of high school and nearly two in five elementary school students had three or more ACEs
- The most common ACEs are loss of a biological parent and household substance abuse



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

#### **Parent Survey:** Because of a very low return rate, parent survey results cannot be used.

• 582 individuals participated in 31 trainings; 8 suicide, 12 substance abuse, 15 mental health

- 67% of participants in suicide and mental health trainings reported improved awareness; 56% at substance abuse trainings
- About half of training participants reported being very or extremely aware of training topic before the training; increasing to about 9 out of 10 after the training

21st Century Community Learning Centers (SUCCESS) offer academic, artistic, and cultural enrichment opportunities to students and their families during non-school hours. A community learning center also assists students in meeting state and local academic achievement standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and mathematics, by providing the students with opportunities for academic enrichment. In addition, centers provide students with a broad array of other activities— such as, art, music, recreation, technology, STEM, mentoring, social/emotional and leadership education programs.

#### **PROGRAM SERVICES:**

- Three school sites offered 129 days of programming in 2014/15 to eligible students in grades 2-5.
- 163 students were formally enrolled in a morning, afternoon, and/or summer out-ofschool program
- 70% of the total students served attended 30 days or more.

#### **PROGRAM OUTCOMES:**

Offers a high-quality environment in which youth build skills. Results from the Youth Program Quality Assessment show that the quality of activities, instruction, and engagement score as highly as other after-school programs in the State of Washington.

**Improves student learning behaviors.** Teachers indicated at the end of the year that the majority of students who needed to improve on a variety of behaviors did improve.
