Diaper Changing

Never leave a child unattended on the diaper changing table.

- The How to Change a Diaper poster must be posted at each diaper changing area.
- The diaper changing area must be:
 - Washable
 - Cleaned and disinfected after each use
 - Separate from food preparation areas
 - Next to a hand washing sink (diapering/hand washing sink must not be the same sink used for preparing food
- Before diapering, gather all items needed.
- Wash hands using soap and water. Using disposable gloves is optional unless blood or blood-containing body fluids may have contact with hands.
- After removing the wat or soiled diaper, clean the child's bottom with wet wipes.
- Only use disposable towels or laundered, reusable towels for cleaning the child.
- Place cloth diapers that belong to the child in a plastic bag. Seal and label with the child's name. Send it home with the child.
- Place disposable diapers, gloves, and wipes in a covered, plastic-lined container that is located close to the diapering area. Do not empty stool into the toilet or rinse the diaper out.
- Put on gloves if applying ointment (Over the Counter Topical Medication-Parent Authorization must be on file).
 Throw away gloves when finished.
- Wash your hands with soap and water or use a wet wipe.
- Diaper and dress the child.
- Help the child wash their hands with soap and water after the diaper change then place the child down in a safe place.
- Wash and disinfect the changing table after every diaper change.
- Wash your hands with soap and warm running water, following the Wash Your Hands Poster.

Diaper Rash/Diaper Dermatitis

Children should not be excluded from class based on a diaper rash. Encourage families to seek the advice of their health care provider if a child has had a red, raised rash for 3 days, or when skin is broken.
