HISTORY

St. Mary's Mission was established in late 1880's with a dormitory for tribal students in the area run by the Catholic Church. This was the primary resource for tribal students in the Okanogan area and the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation. In 1974, The Colville Tribe established the school as a tribally controlled school and renamed it Paschal Sherman Indian School after the first Colville Tribal member who earned a doctorate. A new building for Paschal Sherman Indian School was built in 2008.

Located in Omak, WA, PSIS serves students from diverse tribal backgrounds. PSIS also provides a residential option for students in grades 1 through 9. In the 2022-23 school year, PSIS was identified as a *School of Distinction* during the Cognia accreditation review. We are deeply committed to tribal sovereignty, empowering families, and offering educational experiences that reclaim the traditional culture and language of our community.











QUALITIES, RESPONSIBILITIES AND EXPECTATIONS

- Collaborate with community leaders to integrate cultural perspectives into the curriculum.
- Actively participate in tribal events and ceremonies.
- Build collaborative relationships with tribal leaders, elders, and community members to create a cohesive educational environment.

- Communicate effectively with staff, students, families, and tribal leaders.
- Convey transparent and open communication about school policies, goals, and student progress.

PSIS Demographics and Program Characteristics

Paschal Sherman Indian School (PSIS) educates 168 students ranging from preschool to 9th grade. The staff includes 17certificated, 14 classified, 1 counselor, 2 Mental Health Providers, and 2 administrators. The student body includes 98% Native American (either tribally enrolled or descendant), 3% Hispanic or Latino of any race, 10.5% two or more races, and 1.4% Caucasian. Additionally, 76% of students are classified as low income and 27% receive special education services. Qualified students receive additional supports through, Title I, LAP, Highly Capable, and Title VI programs.

Beginning in the 2022-23 school year, PSIS now operates under the terms of the state-tribal education compact enacted between the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation and the Superintendent of Public Education.

The Area

Surrounded by the Cascade Mountains to the west and the Okanogan National Forest to the east, Omak is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts with its diverse recreational offerings and captivating geography. The majestic Okanogan River flows through the region and the other lakes provide a scenic backdrop for fishing and water sports. In winter, nearby mountain ranges offer superb skiing, snowboarding and snowmobiling. Omak's landscape varies from lush valleys to rugged mountains and boasts numerous parks, trails, and wilderness areas. Omak is a haven for those seeking a rural lifestyle rich in culture and enjoying the great outdoors.
